Dear Members of the Burwood East Primary School Community,

Welcome back everyone. It was delightful to see the staff and children return to school looking rested and happy. I would like to welcome our new families on board and hope that your time here is happy and productive.

Attitudes to School

We have received the results of the Attitudes to School Survey that our Year 4, 5 and 6 students completed in May this year.

The objective of the annual Attitudes to School Survey is to collect data about the opinions of students from Years 4 to 12 to assist schools with planning, developing curriculum and improving student outcomes. The survey assists schools to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and their experience of school. It provides schools with valuable data on students' views of their wellbeing, teaching, learning and school in general. 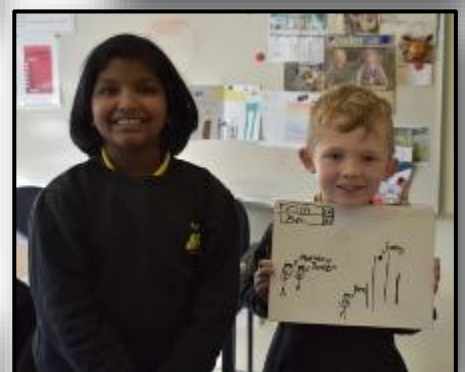
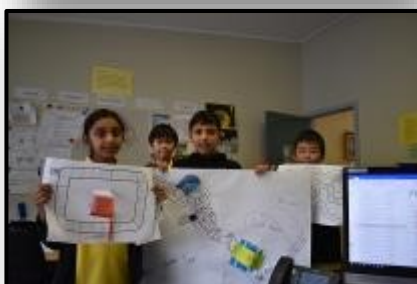

Assistant Principal's Report

Hi everyone,

It is great to be back at Burwood East Primary School after a short break at the end of Term 2. I had a great time visiting Russia during the World Cup and watching Australia play. Unfortunately, the performances on the field were not as great as we had hoped but it was great to see a number of World Class players in action. I was amazed by the generosity and friendliness of the Russian people. This made me reflect on how lucky we are at Burwood East Primary School to have such supportive community, as evidenced this week through our support of the visiting Sister School students who have thoroughly enjoyed their time spent with our students and families. I'd also like to thank the families who have supported these students through home-stay and our staff who have provided a range of experiences for the visiting teachers over the last week.

Buildings and Grounds

Over the holidays a number of building projects were undertaken including the upgrade of our shade sails for our F-2 playground and the renovation works for our student toilets which should be completed by the end of the week. We have also had a number of rooms around the school painted and blinds installed in our Year 1/2 classrooms. I'd like to also thank our students and staff for their patience and understanding these last two weeks whilst the main toilets have been out of action.



Parking

It has been great to see that our families are really making use of the 'No Parking' zone on Highbury Road and the Drop off/Pickup Zone on Blackburn Roads. There has been a noticeable change in the number of families making use of both these areas over the last two weeks. I will continue to work with Vic Roads around improving the traffic management around our school throughout this term.

Team Kids – Holiday Program

Both Darren and myself popped into the holiday program on several occasions throughout the holidays. It was great to see so many smiling faces and students enjoying the program. We had around 15 to 20 students making use of the program each day which was a great success. The students I have spoken to about the program have given positive feedback and we look forward to continuing with Team Kids in the future.



Interviews and Reports - Compass

Semester two reports and our 3-way conferences all ran smoothly through Compass towards the end of Term 2. This term will see parents continue to receive notifications for events in relation to their students. We will also be investigating the use of Learning Tasks which enables students work and feedback from teachers to be shared with parents online. I will provide a further update later in the Term as to when these tasks will become available and how to access them.

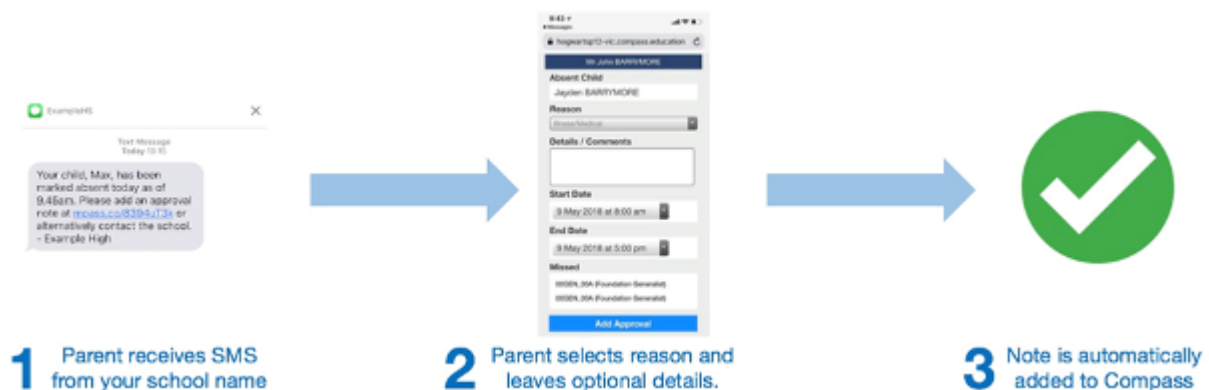
Student Attendance

As mentioned in the Compass Newsfeed to parents. There has been changes in the Department of Education and Training policy around notification of student absences.

Parents will now receive an SMS (Text message) at 10:00am if their child has been marked 'not present' at school.

Parents will then need to click on the link in the text message to explain their child's absence as shown in the attached image.

Alternatively parents can login to Compass to alert the school prior to the start of the school day to add in absences. If for some reason parents can't access Compass please call the school office.



We also require that any late arrivals to school (9:05am or later) MUST be signed in at the office by a parent or guardian before they can present to class.

For early departures, we require that parents sign their child out at the office before collecting them from the classroom as they will need to present the teacher with an early departure card.

Families of students who are late to school will receive letters home explaining the importance of being on time at school and the impact it has on the teaching and learning for all students.

CLASSROOM LEARNING IN 1J

What a busy start to Term 3 in 1J! In Mathematics, we are investigating patterns. We have used beads and unifix cubes to help us. Students explored the purpose and structure of Procedural texts in Writing.

In Reading, our CAFÉ strategy is 'Use pictures, illustrations and diagrams'. We have used pictures in newspapers, story boards and iPads to help us to develop our understanding.

During Inquiry Investigations, students have been discussing 'needs and wants'. We know a need is something we need to survive and a want is just something that we would like, but don't actually need.

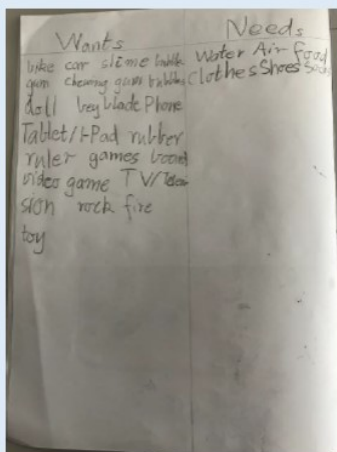
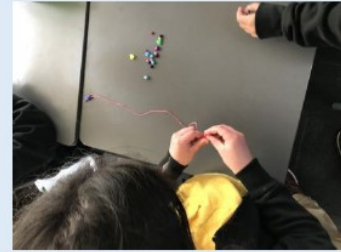

CLASSROOM LEARNING

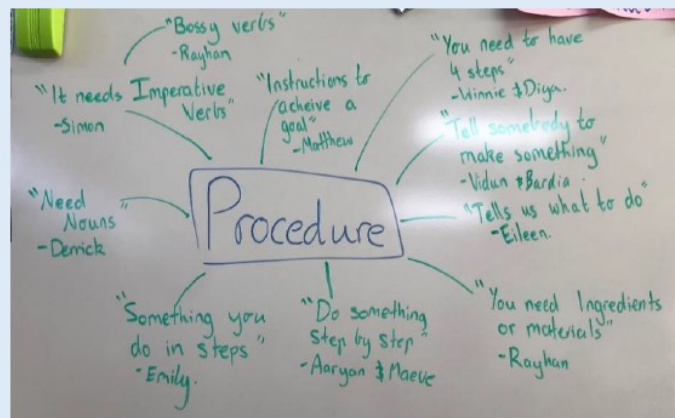
In Mathematics Year 2 students are investigating number patterns and identifying missing elements. Students have been using beads to create patterns and then associate them with numbers. Students used the iPad App 'Explain Everything' to share their pattern with the class.



Our Inquiry Investigations focus this term is 'Needs vs Wants'. Students will develop an understanding of what is an essential item and something that is wanted.

To tune students into the topic they sorted pictures from magazines or newspaper according if they are a need or a want.

In Writing students are currently in the 'Shared Writing' stage. We have immersed ourselves with Procedural texts and are beginning to collaboratively write a procedural text as a class. In the coming weeks we will be following procedures to make some exciting things!

JIANGSU ZHEN JIANG ZHONG SHAN LU PRIMARY SCHOOL 江苏镇江中山路小学

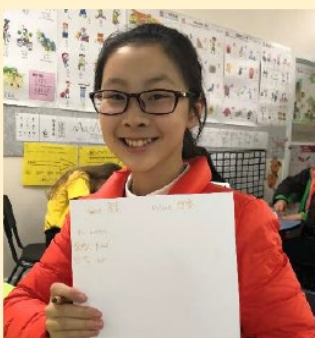

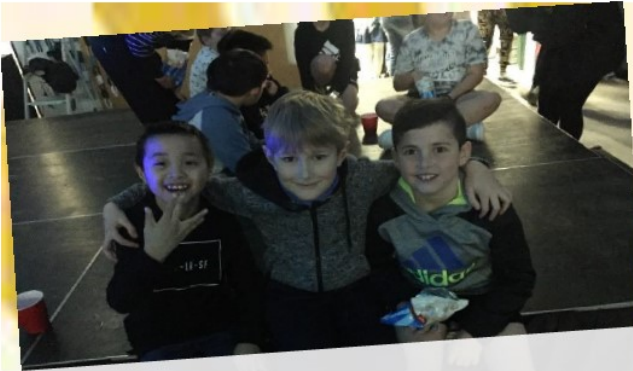

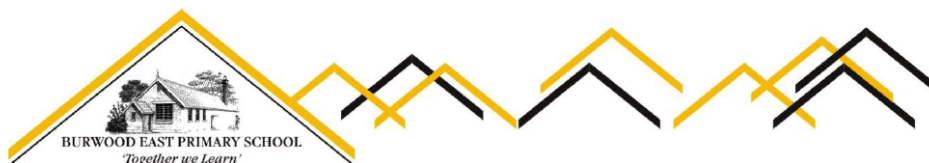

BEING LEFT OUT

Being rejected and ostracised can hurt. Developing friendship skills at school may help young people to navigate relationships throughout their lives.

Developing friendship skills

The shift from home, where they are valued and loved, to school, where not everyone gets along, is a challenge all children face.

Learning friendship skills is the basis of emotional intelligence. Emotional intelligence is highly predictive of success in work and relationships in adult life.

Ideally children use school as a way to broaden their relationships, and this sets them up for being able to work with and relate to a variety of people during their adult years.

It is a strong human desire to belong. Belonging protects us and lessens anxiety. Understandably some children think that 'if I can just replicate that close caring relationship I have with Mum or Dad with one or two close special friends at school, all will be fine'.

However, becoming reliant on only a few friends has its dangers. Most people connect and reconnect with friends as they move through their lives.

Learning to cope with the ebb and flow of human relationships while remaining true to yourself gives people confidence and courage. At times, we all need to have the confidence to endure setbacks in friendships and the courage to be ourselves.

How parents can help children develop friendship skills

Parents can:

- Encourage friendships outside school.
- Model having a range of friends and how to meet new people.
- Increase social activities for the family with a range of people.
- Keep in touch with extended family members.
- Encourage the idea of being friends with an array of people rather than just being close to a few people.

Consider going through a list of your child's classmates with them and identifying the different types of friends. If someone is rejecting or ostracising them, you can explain that there is no point trying to push friendship upon people who are rejecting it. Tell your child that sometimes you need to take a break – when you back off from people, they can move towards you. Try to help identify a few more people to play with and become better friends with.

- Help your child realise that it's a fact of life that not everyone will want to be friends.
- Repeat the importance of having a range of friends in different settings

Community Information and Wellbeing

Burwood East Primary is an inclusive and proactive school that wants to ensure parents are part of their child's learning journey. There is information on extra-curricular activities, community events and assistance in understanding the importance of your child's wellbeing. These pamphlets are located on a carousel in the main foyer and also in the hallway of the junior building.

If your child has voiced concern or you feel there is an issue please speak with their classroom teacher, PLC leader (Daniel Darmody 3-6, Blake Sahlstrom F-2), Andrew Den Elzen or Darren McDonald. In most cases, when concerns are voiced early and the school is able to discuss these with the students a resolution occurs.



The Leader in Me – Term 3, 2018 'Find Your Voice'



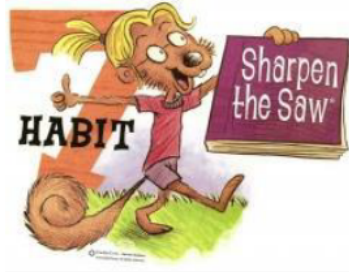
Welcome back to Term 3. Burwood East Primary School has continued to develop our Wellbeing program by enhancing our 5 core values to support our approach to welfare and behavioural standards throughout the school. The students have used the values of Respect, Responsibility, Resilience, Honesty and Confidence to relate to the real world and allow the students to grow into good people. Our Wellbeing program called, 'The Leader in Me', has been a valuable way to develop these core values through teaching the '7 Habits'. It teaches 21st century leadership and life skills to students and creates a culture of student empowerment based on the idea that every child can be a leader.

'The Leader in Me' program works because it sees that every child is capable and can be a leader and that it works from the inside out. Teachers become united by working on the same page which then filters through to the students and then the school community. This year, the students will continue to learn about the '7 Habits of Happy Kids' and how to practise them at school and at home. Each term we will continue to focus on one habit throughout the year. So far, the students became increasingly familiar with habits 1-6, being, 'Be Proactive', 'Begin with the end in Mind', 'First Things First', 'Think Win- Win' and 'Seek first to understand, then to be understood' and 'Synergise'. They focused on these habits each week through reading stories and acting out role-plays to develop their understanding of how to relate the habits to real life situations and become more confident individuals at school and at home.

This term, the students will be focussing on habit 7, 'Sharpen the Saw'. You can help them become more familiar at home and practise some activities together. The more you involve yourself with your children, the better. The more you model the habits, the more they will learn, so put your heart into the activities and have fun together!

Working through these activities with your children will help reinforce desired behaviors and create a common language, which will make them a natural part of your family life. Listed below are some activities that you can practice together.

Habit 7 - 'Sharpen the Saw'



I take care of my body by eating right, exercising, and getting sleep. I spend time with my family and friends. I learn in lots of ways and lots of places.

Sharpen the Saw means to have balance in your life. There is a story of a man who was sawing down a tree and not making a lot of progress. When a passerby asked him why he didn't stop sawing to sharpen his saw, he remarked that he was too busy sawing. Habit 7 reminds us that we are more productive when we are in balance—body, brain, heart and soul. Just like the four tyres on a car, if one area is being ignored or overused, the rest will feel the results. For young children, the car analogy is one they understand; a car could not go on fewer than all four tyres. Explain the four parts of each person (body, brain, heart, and soul) and how important it is to take care of each part to make them all work better.

Younger-Child Activities

1. Develop a Sharpen the Saw activity center in your home. Include arts-and-crafts supplies, learning games, puzzles, classical music, books, etc.
2. Discuss various ways to Sharpen the Saw in all areas. Ideas might include: body (playing outside, riding your bike), brain (balancing reading with TV watching or making smarter choices about what you watch), heart (making a list of what makes you happy and doing something on the list every day, spending time with special friends and family), and soul, (practice mindfulness and relaxation, starting a journal).
3. Read inspiring books. (See the book list in the "Additional Resources" section.)
4. Read Chapter 7 of *The 7 Habits of Happy Kids* book with your child and then complete the Parent's Corner yourself.

Teen Activities

1. Encourage your child to keep a regular journal or blog.
2. Subscribe to magazines that have educational value or read good books.
3. Encourage your teen to get in the habit of reading a newspaper every day. Online works too!
4. Make sure you are modeling the behaviors in steps 1–3 yourself.

Works for All Ages

1. Join a gymnasium or start a regular exercise program with your child.
2. Pick an organisation to volunteer with for you and your child(ren).
3. Visit a new museum or try a new type of cuisine—expand your horizons and try new things.

Habit 7: Sharpen the Saw®

Don't Let the Pigeon Stay Up Late! By Mo Willems. *Don't Let the Pigeon Stay Up Late!* is about a very persistent pigeon that tries everything to be allowed to stay up late. The story will make it easy to talk about how getting enough sleep is a very important part of being a leader of you.

Owl Moon by Jane Yolen. The story of *Owl Moon* follows a young child and his father as they go into the woods to find an owl. The words and pictures are quiet and peaceful and lend themselves to discussing Sharpen the Saw by spending time in nature and with people we care about.

The Snowy Day by Ezra Jack Keats. Peter finds all kinds of imaginative things to do in the snow and even puts some snow in his pocket for later. Peter shows us how playing in the snow, being imaginative, and taking a warm bath afterward are all part of being a leader and sharpening our saw.

Henry Hikes to Fitchburg by D. B. Johnson. Two bears want to get to Fitchburg, but decide to take very different routes to get there. One takes on various jobs to buy a train ticket, while Henry decides to walk, enjoying nature along the way. The contrast of their journeys is evident and illustrates what money can and cannot buy. Although both bears eventually arrive in Fitchburg, Henry has sharpened his saw all along the way and is much happier because of it.

Me, I Am! by Jack Prelutsky. This book encourages children to find the "special" within themselves. The various poems help children realise that everyone is different. Poetry is one way to Sharpen the Saw, and this book has the added advantage of helping children discover themselves and celebrate differences.

Upper School Reading List.

The Mysteries of Harris Burdick by Chris Van Allsburg. These black-and-white drawings can be admired for artistic quality or used for creative-writing prompts in the classroom. *Uncle Willie and the Soup Kitchen* by DyAnne DiSalvo Ryan. A young boy uses his spare time to help Uncle Willie in the city soup kitchen.

The New Kid on the Block by Jack Prelutsky. Containing over 100 poems, this ALSC Notable Book is amusing and refreshing.

A Light in the Attic by Shel Silverstein. This collection of poems offers a nice break from narrative reading so children can Sharpen the Saw.

The Chalk Box Kid by Clyde Robert Bulla. To deal with several upsets in his life, nine-year-old Gregory creates a fantastic chalk garden on the charred walls of a burned-out building behind his house. Through his art, Gregory is able to find his place in the world.

I hope these activities help you and your child set goals and strive to continue to be fantastic BEPS citizens.

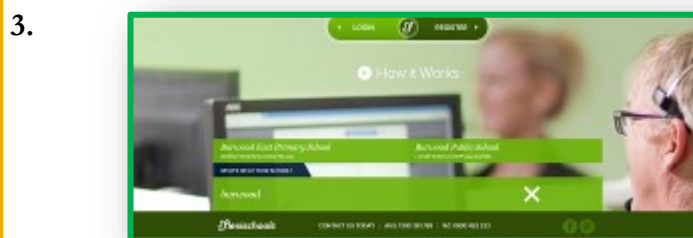

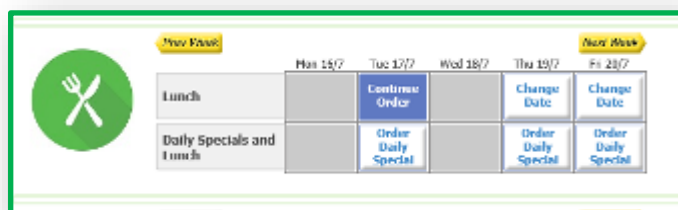

CCS is here! Changes have been made to your Government Subsidy.

Did you know that on **Monday the 2nd of July** the Government's old fee assistance, CCR and CCB, were replaced with a single **Child Care Subsidy (CCS)**. Great news is this new subsidy is available at all Camp Australia services!

CCS affects the amount of fee assistance each family receives. A few things that will determine a family's level of Child Care Subsidy are:

- Annual income will determine the percentage of subsidy a family is eligible for,
- An activity test will determine how many hours of subsidised care families can access, and
- The type of child care service will determine the hourly rate cap

You must confirm your enrolment as soon as possible on the MyGov website: <https://my.gov.au/> and confirm your personal details. This is what determines how much assistance you will receive.

Due to CCS being brand new, **your details will not automatically roll over** from previous years, so to prevent any complications please confirm your enrolment otherwise you may not receive any subsidy until you do so.

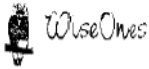

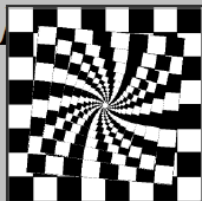
