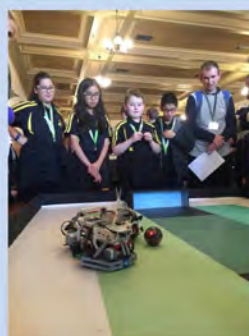

Dear Members of the Burwood East Primary School Community,

As our reputation as a supportive educational environment continues to grow in the community and enrolment trend data based on future developments in and around Burwood East and neighbouring suburbs increases the enrolment capacity of our school will increase in 2018. To support this the Department of Education has provided us with a new Modular 5 portable learning space. This portable learning space has now been positioned on site. Over the next two weeks, Grove Australia PTY will work with contractors to prepare this learning space with the necessary internal structures enabling us to take over occupancy from the beginning of Term 4.

What does it look like?

- The building is a brand new single storey structure encompassing two classrooms with a shared learning space.
- The exterior paintwork is of natural coloration to blend with the environment.
- The dimensions are 18 metres by 10 metres. Each perimeter wall must be 3 metres from existing structures.

Where will it go?

- The learning space has replaced the old Year 3/4 (Blackburn Road) which no longer meets the required standards
- Entry to the building will face the BER Hall

Who will occupy this space?

This will not be decided on until planning for 2018 is completed in mid-Term 4 2017

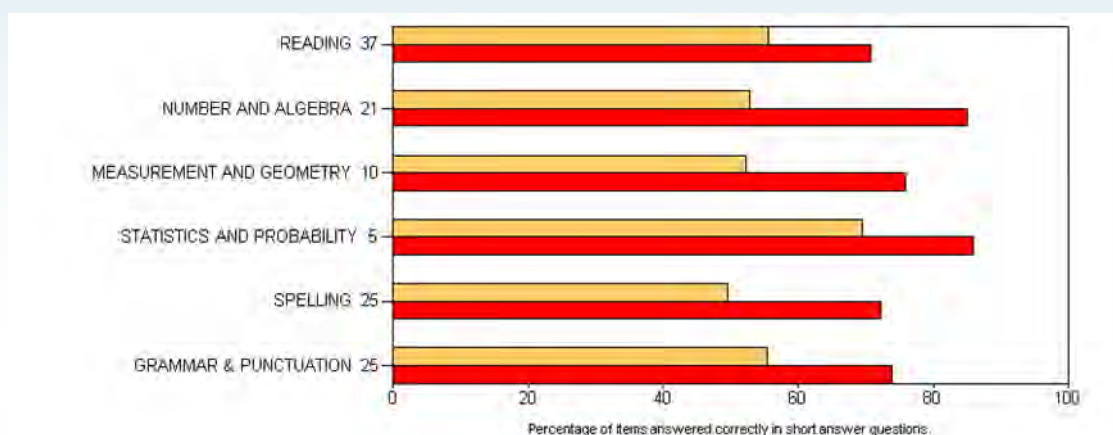
School Crossings

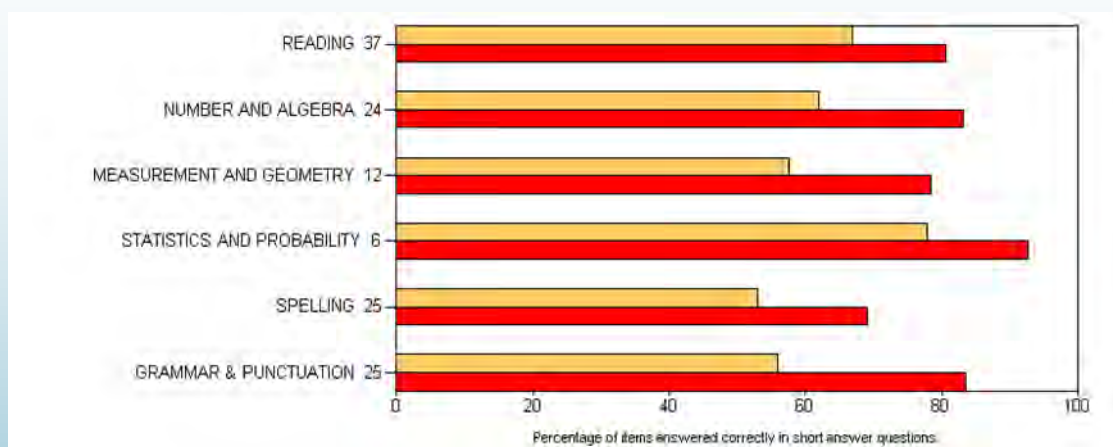
NAPLAN 2017

This week schools received their National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assessment results for this year. The NAPLAN is a nation-wide assessment program where students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 complete assessment tasks in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation and Numeracy (Mathematics). Staff have begun diagnostically analysing the data to inform their teaching – both on an individual level and on whole school level. In analysing the collective NAPLAN reports, it is most pleasing that BEPS has again performed **above state level across all tests**. This is shown in the **Assessment Area Report** graphs below (Year 3 first and Year 5 second) with the percentage of correct answers - state scores in light yellow and BEPS is in dark red:

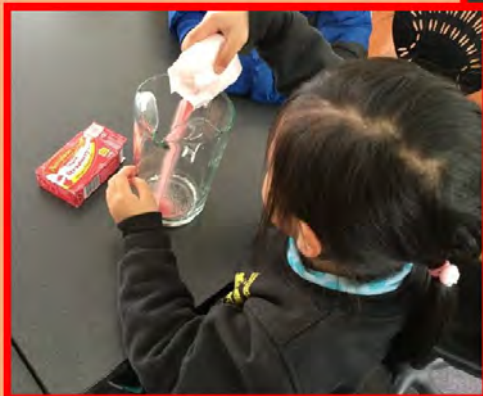

Social Networking

Safety tips for children and parents

Chat and social networking are great ways to stay in touch and find new friends. However, there are some risks meeting people online—especially if you don't know them in real life. When you share things online you may be sharing with people you do not know or trust. Once a message, photo or video has been shared, you also won't be able to control where it goes.

What do I need to know about safe social networking?

- Limit your friend list: don't 'friend' random people.
- Protect your privacy: don't share your password and set your profile to private.
- Your personal details are valuable: don't share them.
- Protect your reputation: keep it clean and ask yourself, would you want others to see what you upload?
- Be careful who you trust: a person can pretend to be someone they are not.
- Don't use a webcam with people you do not know.
- Think before you post, chat, upload or download.

How do I control my privacy settings?

All social networking sites have their own version of 'default' privacy and security settings. It is important that you know how the site works and how to change the settings to protect your personal information.

What are the risks of social networking?

The risks in using social networking sites include:

- Anonymity — it can be easier to say and do things online that you might not do offline.
- Sharing too much information — for example, photos from a party might be okay for close friends to see but can become an issue if shared more widely.
- Not protecting your personal information — account details and location information can be used inappropriately by others to find you or access your online accounts. It is important that you understand the risks associated with disclosing information about yourself online and know how to manage both your privacy and online friends.
- Treating online friends as real friends — it's easy for people to lie online, including those who are seeking children and young people for more than a social relationship. Make sure you are careful about how well you really know your online 'friends'.

What are location-based services?

Many social networking sites take advantage of location-based services, which enable users to report their physical location to others via their mobile phone. By using this function, users can physically locate friends and others from social networking sites. Individuals can 'check-in' from a location to let others know their whereabouts. On some social networking services the location-based functions are turned on by default. To manage these services, and retain your privacy, review your social networking settings to block the function or to limit who sees your location-based information.

We recommend having conversations with your child about safety online. Be supportive and positive. Listening and taking their feelings into account helps keep conversation afloat. For more information visit <https://www.esafety.gov.au/esafety-information>

What is GATEWAYS?

G.A.T.E.WAYS runs a range of programs which parents of gifted and highly able children can enrol in directly. These programs include: Brainwaves Club, Holiday Club, Festivals and Leadership.

Why GATEWAYS?

G.A.T.E.WAYS aims to cater for children who are in the highly able to gifted range. This approximates the top 10 – 15% of children in the classroom. Programs are delivered at a faster pace than in the regular classroom, and are pitched around two years ahead of chronological age.

What does Burwood East Primary School offer?

At Burwood East, GATEWAYS offers two programs that run through the school terms.



When attending a day-long Eureka program, children participate in three hands-on workshops based on a theme. Each term the theme changes to focus on a different curriculum area. Previous themes have included '*Curious Science*,' '*You Can Count On Maths*,' '*History Matters*,' '*What Nonsense*,' '*Secret Maths*,' and '*Grossology*.'



Journeys are extended programs for highly able children. They attend once a week for four half days and explore a topic in depth. Subject matter is wide-ranging and is often in areas not always taught in the primary school curriculum. Participants as young as six can become detectives solving hypothetical mysteries, work as archaeologists on a 'dig', explore the wonders of the universe, the mathematics of infinity, the world of the brothers Grimm or Gothic literature, or take part in a philosophical 'community of inquiry'. The possibilities are unlimited.


